U.N. War Crimes Prosecutor Explores Genocide, Justice, and Hope in Carlisle Dermot Groome spent almost five years pursuing justice against the man known as "The Butcher of Bosnia," Serbian General, Ratko Mladic. In the end Groome and his team proved that Mladic was responsible for thousands of civilian deaths. On October 26 Groome will host an afternoon and evening of experiences designed to help participants understand what happened, how Mladic was brought to justice, and what it was like for the hundreds of Bosnian refugee families who came to the Cumberland Valley to rebuild their lives after the genocide. Groome is currently on the faculty of Penn State Dickinson Law School and a hero to the over 1500 Bosnians who now make their home in the Cumberland Valley. Zinaid Granic was born the year before the genocide peaked with the massacre of 8,372 people in the Bosnian town of Srebrenica. He now is the Imam of the Bosnian Islamic Cultural Center in Carlisle and the youngest Bosnian Imam in North America. Granic's community is excited by this opportunity to tell their story. "I remember watching Mr. Groome on TV [in Bosnia] during the trial; I never
